I strongly endorse the nomination of the Benedictine Women of Madison for Gathering Waters' 2022 Land Legacy Conservation Leadership Award.

Care for the Land is an integral component of the vision and reality at the campus of Holy Wisdom Monastery on the north side of Lake Mendota in the Town of Westport in Dane County. The Sisters who make up Benedictine Women of Madison have embraced stewardship of the land as an equal part of their ministry of worship, hospitality, retreats, and education.

The Monastery has created an active ecological restoration program involving many community volunteers to restore prairie, savanna, and oak woodland communities. In collaboration with Dane County, the Monastery has worked to eliminate runoff into nearby Lake Mendota and has set aside land for a planned segment of the North Mendota bike/hike path connecting to Gov. Nelson State Park on the north side of the Lake.

More than 20 years ago, the Monastery began restoration of Lost Lake by the removal of sediment, greatly improving habitat for amphibians and migratory waterfowl. In 2012, the Monastery boldly purchased 53 acres of land that had been slated for development. Ecological restoration across the campus is supported by the volunteers of Friends of Wisdom Prairie. As part of the Monastery's ministry of hospitality, the public is welcome to visit the campus. The Monastery offers field trips, speakers, and events to inform and educate everyone about the land.

The Benedictine Women of Madison are strongly deserving of the 2022 Land Legacy Conservation Leadership Award.

My initial meeting with them was to discuss the seeding of a prairie on their property and it was then that I was introduced to their process of thinking about the land and their place within it. I was immediately impressed with their questions about the restoration process and their concern about how this prairie would fit into not only the larger ecological landscape but also the cultural landscape. The land and natural resources at Holy Wisdom Monastery are vitally important to the ministry and those who are seeking solitude or contemplation.

Please accept this letter nominating the Benedictine Women of Madison for the Land Legacy Award category in the 2022 Land Conservation Leadership Awards.

The Benedictine Women of Madison (BWM) are a monastic community of five women who live and work at Holy Wisdom Monastery in Middleton. A core part of their mission is active restoration of 191 acres that includes prairies, woodlands, wetlands and a glacial lake. Since 1953, the BWM have been dedicated stewards of the land. Early stewardship projects focused on planting gardens, orchards and trees on the property.

Beginning in the early 1990s, the BWM expanded their stewardship to include landscape-scale ecological restoration. For example, in 1996, the BWM embarked on a three-year project restoring Lost Lake, a glacial lake that had been almost entirely silted in by erosion from adjacent agricultural and residential land. Eighty-five thousand cubic yards of accumulated silt were removed from the lake and the shoreline was planted with native species. Restored to near its original depth, Lost Lake once again provides retention and filtration for stormwater that would otherwise wash into Lake Mendota.

In the next decade, the BWM continued their stewardship work by planting more than 120 acres of prairie. These highly diverse plantings primarily consisted of seeds collected or donated by volunteers. With most of the prairie habitat planted, recent conservation efforts have focused on restoring oak savannas and woodlands. In a wonderful testament to the quality of the land protection efforts, numerous threatened and endangered species – including Red-headed Woodpecker, Rusty-patched Bumblebee and Regal Fritillary – have been documented at Holy Wisdom.

After restoring much of the land, the BWM decided to decommission their old, energy-inefficient building. The new building opened in 2009 and the U.S. Green Building Council awarded it a Platinum rating; earning 63 out of a possible 69 points under the LEED-New Construction rubric, the new monastery building was the highest-rated LEED building in the United States when it opened. In 2014, the BWM further improved their sustainability by

installing 463 new solar panels that provide approximately 60% of the monastery building's energy use. BWM's goal is to generate 100% of their energy needs onsite within the next two years.

The Benedictine Women of Madison are deserving and inspiring recipients for the 2022 Land Legacy Award. For seven decades, they have demonstrated courage and leadership in their commitment to protecting their land. And by generously sharing their property with the public, they ensure that their land serves as a place of healing, connection and renewal for people as well as nature.
