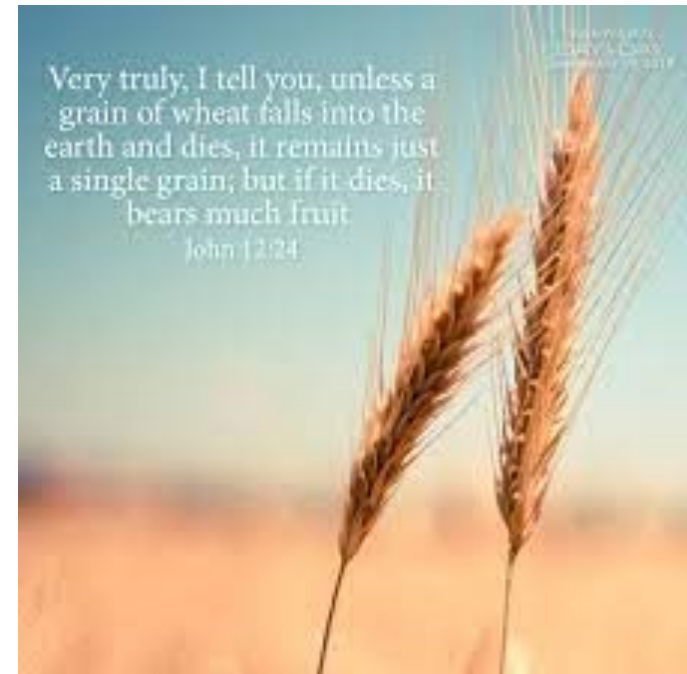





Given to us in the example of Jesus.**

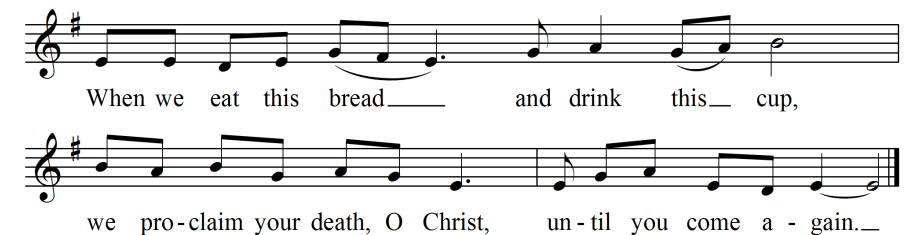
Through Christ, with Christ, in Christ,
