On September 15th with the Community of Communities surrounding the sisters, Everline Jeruto, OSB made her final monastic profession, as a member of Benedictine Women of Madison, and Joanne Kollasch, OSB renewed her promises to God and the community for the 70th anniversary of her monastic profession.



COMMUNITY COOKOUT

The Community Cookout on August 8th brought together community members, neighbors and newcomers for an evening of fun and fellowship. Attendees showed up in great numbers, to enjoy food and the monastery's beautiful grounds. The event offered a variety of activities, including butterfly crafts, temporary tattoos, games for all ages, tours and a scavenger hunt of the monastery, providing entertainment for children and adults alike.

Highlights

Net-Zero Completion

In 2024, Holy Wisdom Monastery officially became a net-zero energy campus, marking the latest milestone in seven decades of environmental stewardship by the Benedictine Women of Madison.

A COMMUNITY-POWERED VISION

Prompted by the need to replace the aging gas boiler in the Retreat & Guest House, the \$3.2 million initiative was accomplished through two phases: installing a 300-kilowatt ground-mounted solar array with grid interconnection, and replacing the Retreat & Guest House's failing HVAC system with sustainable geothermal technology. We received remarkable community support from funders, grants, tax credits, in-kind work and donations to complete the project. Our donors contributed \$128,509 toward the project cost.

This achievement is celebrated annually with the Spring Solar Tilt, where over 90 volunteers gather to hand-



crank solar panels into their summer position. Following a blessing over the array, teams named after native prairie plants work together, transforming maintenance into meaningful community action against climate anxiety.

RESTORING CREATION

The solar array sits on land that tells a powerful restoration story. As chronicled in Dr. Amy Alstad's "A Story About a Lake and a Prairie and an

Array of Solar Panels," this ground has witnessed the restoration of Lost Lake and now complements the surrounding thriving prairie by growing solar power.

This net-zero milestone continues the Benedictine sisters' visionary environmental leadership. Now more than ever, Holy Wisdom Monastery stands as a living demonstration that environmental stewardship and spiritual practice work hand in hand.


